Wife of Boriwoi, the first Christian Duke of Bohemia, b. at Mielnik, c. 860; d. at Tetin, near Beraun, 15 September, 921. She and her husband were baptized, probably by St. Methodius, in 871. Pagan fanatics drove them from their country, but they were soon recalled, and after reigning seven more years they resigned the throne in favour of their son Spitignev and retired to Tetin. Spitignev died two years later and was succeeded by Wratislaw, another son of Boriwoi and Ludmilla. Wratislaw was married to Drahomira, a pretended Christian, but a secret favourer of paganism. They had twin sons, St. Wenceslaus and Boleslaus the Cruel, the former of whom lived with Ludmilla at Tetin. Wratislaw died in 916, leaving the eight-year-old Wenceslaus as his successor. Jealous of the great influence which Ludmilla wielded over Wenceslaus, Drahomira instigated two noblemen to murder her. She is said to have been strangled by them with her veil. She was at first buried in the church of St. Michael at Tetin, but her remains were removed to the church of St. George at Prague before the year 1100, probably by St. Wenceslaus, her grandson. She is venerated as one of the patrons of Bohemia, and her feast is celebrated on 16 September.

Luke's gospel is replete with many beautiful parables or short morality stories. Today's reading about the Prodigal Son fits squarely within that genre as one of the most poignant in the New or first Testament. The pericope or selection opens with a "double audience" of the sympathetic but religiously suspect " tax collectors and sinners" and Jesus' ever present critics the "Pharisees and those skilled in religious law." For the Pharisees, Jesus was too cavalier in his approach to religious tradition and practice. After all, they (the orthodox) would argue that those tax collectors or those who collaborated with the pagan Romans and the sinners who did not observe all the requirements of the Law were by their "irreligious" attitudes already condemned. Life in the world to come was for these religious folk a reward for specific obedience to the Law. Now Jesus' short moral story of the "wayward son, the forgiving father and the merciless brother" itself an illustrated response to such judgmental attitudes brought home a clear lesson. The merciful father certainly is a loving image of God Himself who gives, yearns for his younger son and forgives. The younger son could certainly stand as a symbol of those who have strayed: unmindful of the hurt they carelessly caused, they come back to themselves, seek forgiveness through repentance in the open arms of their father. The figure of the merciless brother, conversely, was a direct indictment of the Pharisees and scribes glorying in their unforgiving attitudes and peevish behavior which effectively annulled the record of religious fidelity and constancy. The lesson is clear. As important and necessary as religious observance is, we can all fall into the trap of selfsatisfaction paradoxically through religious practice. Self-congratulation with one's record of practice and ethical behavior is a form of hypocrisy if we cannot open our hearts in forgiveness. Today's gospel is beautifully relates how the merciful father went out to both the repentant son and his unforgiving brother; in other words, God even meets us in our very painful sinful moments. Do we recognize Him?

FATHER ALEJANDRO MORAL ANTON OSA, ELECTED PRIOR GENERAL OF THE AUGUSTINIAN ORDER



It is with great joy and sincere gratitude to God that we announce the election of Fr. Alejandro Moral Antón as the 97th Prior General of the Order of Saint Augustine, on this day, September 4, 2013, the Feast of Our Mother of Consolation, Patroness of the Order. We call upon the intercession of Our Mother of Good Counsel, of our Holy Father Saint Augustine and of all of our Saints and Blesseds, that our Order, under his leadership, may increase in unity and holiness

Father Alejandro was born in La Vid (Burgos), Spain, on June 1, 1955. He entered the novitiate of the Augustinian Province of Spain in 1972 and professed his religious vows on September 12, 1973. Following studies in La Vid and Madrid, he continued his academic preparation at the Collegio Internazionale S. Monica in Rome, and made his Solemn Profession in September, 1980. He was ordained to the priesthood on June 20, 1981.

Father Alejandro served his Province at various times as librarian, bursar, director of formation, and Provincial counselor. In 1995, at the age of 40, he was elected Prior Provincial and served in this capacity until his election as Vicar General of the Order in 2001. From that time until his election as Prior General he has been a member of the Order's General Curia and has held various responsibilities: as President for the Commission charged with the revision of the Constitutions, President of the Economic Commission. and President of the Order's Secretariat for Justice and Peace; from 2004 until the present he has served as Procurator General of the Order and since 2009 has been Assistant to one of the two Federations of Augustinian Contemplative Nuns in Spain. Father Alejandro has also worked extensively with the Order's international commissions of Laity, Education, Finances and Spirituality. He has published various articles on Sacred Scripture and the Religious Life, and several works on Augustinian translated Spirituality into Spanish. He comes to the Office of Prior General, therefore, with much experience, that augurs well for his service to the Order.
