The Reflection of the Gospel

We have been on the Lenten journey now for five weeks, and the strains of the trip are showing. The resolutions for a "well-spent" Lent, so generously made on Ash Wednesday, are frequently forgotten as we are now near the end of a long journey. For the Jewish people ideally there were annual three pilgrimages mandated. These aliyah or "ascents" were marked by outbursts of rejoicing as the pilgrims neared their goal, the great Temple in Jerusalem. In fact, certain psalms (120 through 127), recited as "gradual songs" (or "walking psalms"), are replete with themes of looking to the mountains of God for help, and rejoicing when approaching the Temple at the end of an arduous journey. "I rejoiced when they said to me, 'We are going up to God's house!'"

In today's gospel, there is this mixed joyful and foreboding anticipation as Jesus approaches His final "hour". His deepest feelings on His coming destiny are set within a request by some pagan Greeks desiring "to see" Him. And, as so often in John's gospel, a seemingly chance phrase now conveys the profound connotation of both "believing in and accepting." Belief in the work of God accomplished through Jesus will shortly be tested for acceptance or rejection through the scandal of trial and temptation. Perhaps, one of the great trials for Jesus' own disciples will be a "dying to" certain expectations of God. Why did God allow this? What happened to the glad "Hosannas" of Palm Sunday shouted by the adulatory crowds? The response is hardly satisfying if not at once unnerving: "unless the grain of wheat falls...and dies" there can be no life. But we are not to fear this painful process because "where I am there will be my servant." Jesus promises to identify Himself with those who follow him through the days of his passion. Easy? Certainly not. Publicly the Lord speaks about His personal anguish as "troubling" and fearful. We, His disciples, are not exempt from this same anguish and dread but the power of the Lord's constancy and unswerving purposeful obedience was rewarded with resurrection. And it is through His glorious resurrection we have been freed. Qualis rex, talis grex or "the destiny of the leader is the destiny of the follower."

Study of the First Reading

As a prophet, Jeremiah was a peaceful man from a priestly family. He grew up under the religious reforms of King Josiah, but saw the corruption and downfall of the nation. At first, Jeremiah preached for the religious reforms of king Josiah. When succeeding kings turned away from the reforms, however, Jeremiah railed against the royal and religious abuses. With the coming Babylonian exile, Jeremiah preached the destruction of the nation. But, Jeremiah offered a ray of hope with a new covenant that God would offer to a chastened people. [31-32] With the destruction of Jerusalem and the exile of people to Babylon, the institutions of the old covenants were gone. The ark of the covenant in the Temple (which represented God's covenant at Sinai) was gone. The Temple that represented worship to God was gone. The institution of the king (which represented God's covenant to David) was gone. Their absence led the way for a new covenant. [33] The new covenant God offered was an intimate one. The people would no longer rely on institutions or culture for a relationship with God. God Himself would reach out to His people. The new covenant would be with people's hearts. People would intuitively know ethical conduct and true worship based upon the love God has for them and the love they returned. [34] How would people know God's love? People would know God through His forgiveness. Forgiveness is a way to "re-create" people anew. When God stated He would no longer remember the people's sin. He meant that the memory and the consequences of immoral acts would be erased from the natural order. It would be as if God had created the universe so that the immorality never existed! The people would return to God with grateful hearts.

The Augustinians we have been in what is now the Czech Republic for over 750 years. So many friars and sisters, so many projects, so much work had been undertaken over these centuries. And, now, it is up to us not only the Augustinians but the whole extended "Augustinian family" including our families, friends, benefactors, parishioners; in other words, all who are close to us. During this coming year beginning in March and ending in December we wish to remind you of various events important to us as Augustinians laboring now for the glory of God and the spread of the gospel in the Czech Republic. Our Anniversary jubilee will be commemorated in the various monasteries throughout the country.

At **Svata Dobrotiva** we will open our jubilee year on March 24 marking the traditional date of Our Lady's appearance to Lord Ulrich of Valdek who invited the Augustinians to the Czech lands in 1262. At Svata Dobrotiva the 15th Annual Marian Pilgrimage on May 19th will take place followed on June 30th with the visit of Cardinal Duka, OP, who will confer the sacrament of Confirmation at Mass.

On April 23rd through the 26th the XV Annual Augustinian Week will be held here at **Saint Thomas, Prague.**

On August 15th in **Dolní Ročov** the titular Patroness of the Church, Our Lady of the Assumption, willbe solemnly celebrated.

On Septemberr 28th in **Běla pod Beždezem**, the Solemnity of Saint Wencelaus coincides with the 300th Anniversary of the consecration of the Monastery Church.

Special tours of our former monasteries and churches in Domazlice (founded 1287), Mělnik (1268) and Ćeská Lipa (1623) will be organized.

On November 13th in **Saint Thomas Church**, Prague, we will commemorate both the birthdate of Saint Augustine (AD 354) and the last consecration date of our Church (2004).
