

St. Thomas Church: established July 1, 1285 by King Vaclav II

St. Thomas Church

Very often we hear the lament that *Mass* or *Church* or *Religion* "does nothing for me." The once a week gathering for liturgy in a cold church compounded with difficulties in trying to gather *meaning* out of the readings or sermon can be a severe test of faith for some people many times and for many, some times. It is understandable. Just as every priest is not a consummate pulpit orator with impressive powers of persuasion so every church building- as lovely as it occasionally can be- can ever measure up to the "perfect" atmosphere conducive to prayer and spiritual empowerment. At best, most of us with varying degrees of openness can come together and reflect on our common faith with understanding for each other's sensitivities and cultural differences. After all, the word *catholic* comes from the Greek meaning *universal* or *all embracing*.

Today's reading reflect this spirit. Paul, the empowered charismatic, openly enters into dialogue with his Jewish coreligionists in the remote province Pisidia (now central Turkey). His electrifying presentation of the "good news' of Jesus of Nazareth provokes mixed reviews. The leaders, in particular, are hostile and Paul then turns to the gentiles (the govim or non-Jews). The second reading from the mysterious book of *Revelation* again tell the same story. The gospel was preached throughout the Roman Empire. Various emperors such as Nero (+68) and the mad man, Domitian (+96) had embarked on a sanguinary extermination campaign "to rid the world of the Christian pest". The survivors of these pogroms told the tale in the Acts of the Apostles and the later Revelations. The third reading is taken from John's gospel which is among the last of 27 books written in the second or New Testament. Among the symbols used by John to portray Jesus as a source of help and guidance during these terrible days of persecution and falling away is that of the good shepherd. In the first or Old Testament, the shepherd was a designation given to kings, leaders and even to God himself. As we read, the allusion was not lost on Jesus' adversaries. The sheep, that is, those who heed the gospel are assured eternal life and will not *perish* because Jesus is *one* with the Father from whom no one can snatch or steal. This implicit recognition of Jesus' divine status, a sheer blasphemy for Jesus' orthodox hearers was, if anything, reason for his own execution. Today as we share the joy of our young parishoners who are approaching the Eucharistic table for the first time, let us look into our lives and ask the simple question, are we convinced followers of Jesus or does the mettle of discipleship still rest on conditions of atmosphere, climate or aesthetic entertainment?

Suddenly he saw his kitten licking from the bowl of mix and reached to push her away, knocking the egg carton to the floor. Frantically he tried to clean up this monumental mess but slipped on the eggs, getting his pajamas white and sticky.

Just then he saw Dad standing at the door. Big crocodile tears welled up in Brandon's eyes. All he'd wanted to do was something good, but he'd made a terrible mess. He was sure a scolding was coming, maybe even a spanking. But his father just watched him.

Then, walking through the mess, he picked up His crying son, hugged him and loved him, getting his own pajamas white and sticky in the process.

That's how God deals with us. We try to do something good in life, but it turns into a mess. Our marriage gets all sticky or we insult a friend or we can't stand our job or our health goes sour. Sometimes we just stand there in tears because we can't think of anything else to do. That's when God picks us up and loves us and forgives us, even though some of our mess gets all over Him.

Just because we might mess up, we can't stop trying to "make pancakes," for God or for others. Sooner or later we'll get it right, and then they'll be glad we tried....

It is not in the falling down that we define ourselves as Christians but in the getting up to try again and walk in the path of Christ.


