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GOSPEL STUDY

In contrast to Mark, Matthew and Luke, John does not assume that the "Last Supper" or Jesus' final farewell meal is a *Passover celebration*. Whereas the first three evangelists in so emphasizing the Passover atmosphere of this meal appear to link Jesus' own mission of salvation to that singular Exodus event in Israel's history. For contemporary Jews the Passover meal was something more than a meticulously regulated culinary experience. It had to be prepared by a male of the household (Exodus 12:3) and served by a widow first to all the males of the household then to the women and children. Mark even footnotes that the place for the repast would be readily identified by a man carrying a pitcher of water (Mark 14:13)- a task assumed only by women. There were other aspects to a formal meal in ancient Judaism. Mutual table fellowship confirmed one's status in the community. To break bread together and to drink of one cup denoted shared recognized values and common beliefs. It was during such a meal that Judas Iscariot definitively had to break ranks with Jesus (Mark 14:17). Ordinarily, great attention was paid to such circumstances as one's dinning companions, ritual ablutions, priority in seating arrangements, the type and manner of food being served, the utensils, the order of servings- not to mention the carefully chosen topics for discussion. For such cultural infractions Jesus was more than once vehemently attacked and stigmatized as "a sinner." Thus, for Jesus this Passover-farewell dinner already steeped in symbolism became itself a means of cementing his loving relationship with his disciples. In the face of impending evil *Do this*- that is, break bread and drink of this cup in memory of me. This Eucharist or Thanksgiving is not only to be remembered but is to be eaten, drunk and rightly adored by us who believe, hope, love and follow him whatever the cost discipleship may exact.

The feast of Corpus Christi or the Most Sacred Body and Blood of the Lord is that feast wherein we as a Christian community are given the opportunity to manifest our worship of the Lord in the Holy Eucharist. This honor is shown in many ways. The solemn procession or "walk" with Jesus Christ present in the Host is a sign of willing discipleship (*Luke 19:36*); incense is used in recognition of the kingship of the Lord and a sign "of the prayers of God's holy people" (*Revelation 5:8*). The four altars (in St. Joseph's, in St. Thomas, in St. Barbara's chapel and at the Main Altar in the Church) represent the Four Corners of the earth. Before each altar the following rite is observed:

- 1. The Blessed Sacrament is placed on the altar and incensed during which the hymn *Down in Adoration Falling* is sung;
- 2. The Gospel is read followed by a moment of reflection;
- 3. Prayers of the Faithful;
- 4. The Priest recites a short prayer and then blesses the congregation with the Monstrance.
- 5. The Procession then continues on to the next station or altar.

"Adoration means entering the depths of our hearts in communion with the Lord, who makes Himself bodily present in the Eucharist. In the monstrance, He always entrusts Himself to us and asks us to be united with His Presence, with his risen Body."

I would like to read from Mathew 19:

Some Pharisees came to Jesus, testing Him and asking, "Is it lawful for a man to divorce his wife for any reason at all?" 4 And He answered and said, "Have you not read that He who created them from the beginning made them male and female, 5 and said, 'For this reason a man shall leave his father and mother and be joined to his wife, and the two shall become one flesh'? 6 So they are no longer two, but one flesh. On one of these long walks, once I was older and my attention had turned to girls I asked my Grandfather: "If a relationship is a 50 / 50 thing; then how does one know when he is giving his 50%.

My Grandfather thought about this one and began to laugh in what was one of the most unique and recognizable laughs, a laugh that he was famous for.

He asked me, "Do you know what it is like to give 110% to something?" Being athletic and sports natured, I answered yes.

He then added "When you feel like you are giving 110% an then you reach down and give a little more; Your probably pretty close to that 50/50."

I have never forgotten that and as we walked he went on to explain to me that we never know just how much the other person is doing for us, we can never know all the frustration and the support that they give or even the things that they resist saying.

The same is most likely true of our relationship with God. We do not see or recognize all the things that he does for us every day, and then we find it hard to remain committed to him ...or we don't have the energy to observe our prayers or to come to Mass.

So here is to giving 110%, may we realize the joy in our relationships, as we get closer to 50%.
