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St. Thomas Church

A parable or short story with an implied moral lesson, was Jesus' favorite method of teaching. Quite unique in the ancient world- though distantly related to a fable (popularized by Aesop, the fabulist)- a parable freely uses the circumstances of persons in "real life" as a teaching leading to a profound moral lesson. In today's parable of the rich man and his poor counterpart, Lazarus, Jesus launches into a very discomforting story for his Pharisaic audience. The Pharisees, basically religious people trying to do the will of God in infinitesimal detail were, no doubt, unnerved by Jesus' apparent condemnation of the rich man. After all, ran the Pharisaic argument, the rich man was precisely rich and healthy (thus blessed) because God so willed it; and the poor man (Lazarus) was diseased and destitute (thus punished) because of some sin he, or his parents, had committed. Jesus' novel reversal of destiny- rich man in hell and Lazarus in heaven- therefore, challenged some cherished pharisaic theological givens.

We, post-moderns, can be put off by the simplistic tone of this parable. After all, what do we have to do with "Pharisees" or some esoteric fabled world of compartmental suffering as this imagined hell is here depicted. Again, the lesson learned is not to be confused with the vehicle of instruction. Rather, we are challenged to look within our hearts and consciences there to examine our own attitudes towards success, prosperity, the poor, the diseased, the unfortunate or marginalized. The task is difficult since it is very easy to cover oneself in a blanket of rationalizations that can be as comforting as were those simplistic pharisaic doctrines of reward (=riches) and punishment (=disease and poverty). Where do we stand in all this? Or do we even take a stand delaying as we so often do, at the banquet table of daily life?

28th September **St. Wenceslaus**

(Also Vaclav, Vaceslav.)

Duke, martyr, and patron of Bohemia, born probably 903; died at Alt-Bunzlau, 28 September, 935.

His parents were Duke Wratislaw, a Christian, and Dragomir, a heathen. He received a good Christian education from his grandmother (St. Ludmilla) and at Budweis. After the death of Wratislaw, Dragomir, acting as regent, opposed Christianity, and Wenceslaus, being urged by the people, took the reins of government. He placed his duchy under the protection of Germany, introduced German priests, and favoured the Latin rite instead of the old Slavic, which had gone into disuse in many places for want of priests. Wenceslaus had taken the vow of virginity and was known for his virtues. The Emperor Otto I conferred on him the regal dignity and title. For religious and national motives, and at the instigation of Dragomir, Wenceslaus was murdered by his brother Boleslaw. The body, hacked to pieces, was buried at the place of murder, but three years later Boleslaw, having repented of his deed, ordered its translation to the Church of St. Vitus in Prague. The gathering of his relics is noted in the calendars on 27 June, their translation on 4 March; his feast is celebrated on 28 September.
