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Reflection on the Gospel

The evolution of the church's calendar would serve as interesting history. Today's solemnity of Christ the King is a case in point. As far as feasts go, it was put on the calendar only in 1925, immediately after the ravages of the First World War with the accompanying rise of that triad of competing ideologies of nationalism, national socialism (Nazism) and atheistic communism (Marxism). The pope at the time, Pius XI (from 1922 to 1939), faced with these menaces, was moved to reiterate the kingship of Jesus Christ, who, in the words of today's preface "as king claims dominion over all creation, that he may present to you, his almighty Father, an eternal and universal kingdom: a kingdom of truth and life, a kingdom of holiness and grace, a kingdom of justice and peace." Sentiments and ideals certainly at variance with the programs of the likes of Hitler, Mussolini or Stalin. Pope Pius XI resolutely set out to expose these ideological errors which were being either accepted or ruthlessly imposed on millions in such purportedly "Christian" nations as Russia, Germany and even Italy. In swift succession he first attacked national socialism (Hitler's eugenics, euthanasia and 'master race' vagaries) on 14 March 1937 and five days later he took on atheistic communism with his letter, Divini Redemptoris. In 1938 he challenged and condemned Mussolini's fascist regime in Italy when it, too, adopted Hitler's racial doctrines. Toward the end of that same year of 1938, this tireless pope, while in the midst of preparing a letter condemning antisemitism, fell mysteriously ill, suffered on in great agony and died finally 10 February 1939. For such prophetic figures as Pius XI, Jesus is Lord, and, as such, he exercises dominion: for his are the ages despite the transient opposition. Nowhere in scripture except in today's gospel reading (Matthew 25:34,40) does Jesus refer to himself as king; in fact, he avoided the title for its contemporary political implications (John 6:15). It is only in his passion that he is recognizedalbeit in mock reverence- by a pagan governor who taunts the sensitivities of a lynching mob with the title king (John 18:36 et seq.). When Jesus, the Son of Man, the King, returns he will, indeed, judge not so much doctrinal content as conduct. "I assure you," he says "as often as you did it for one of my least brothers and sisters, you did it for me. (Matthew 25:45) What else can you add?

Study of Today's Readings

FIRST READING: "Pride goes before the fall." But after the fall, what happens next? This was the question Ezekiel tried to answer for his contemporaries taken into captive exile. As the son of a priest, Ezekiel was taken into exile by the Babylonians. Soon after, Ezekiel felt the call to prophesy among his countrymen. Through visions and strange behavior, Ezekiel tried to explain why the Jews were in exile. And he looked ahead to God's salvation. While the Jews lost all because of their sin, they would be gathered together by the power of God. The Lord would bring the Diaspora (communities of Jews spread throughout the world) back to worship in Jerusalem, like a shepherd gathers lost sheep who strayed from the flock [34:11-12]. He would care for the injured. But there would be judgment, for not all the lost would be innocent [34:15-17]. While the exiles felt guilt and remorse for their sin, they needed a counterbalance in hope. We, too, need hope to pull us out of our funk. But we need a firm reason for hope. That reason is God himself.

SECOND READING: Despite the simple logic of faith, many in the Corinthian church denied the general resurrection. In fact, the young community was torn apart by in-fighting, cliques, and turf battles. The instruments of choice for these battles were questions of faith, especially the nature and scope of the resurrection. Two issues added to the controversy.

Next Sunday we begin Advent time, preparation for Christmas. At the Mass on Saturday and Sunday we will bless the Advent wreath. . Please bring to the Church the one you are going to have at home and we will bless during the Mass.
